Field Day for Everyone

June is here and as a ham radio operator, we all know what is in store... Field Day! It is probably the biggest and most well known activity for clubs or individuals. This is an opportunity to get folks on the air, promote their club, be an ambassador for the hobby and network with others. Take advantage of the season and get set up outside, hopefully at a location that is in the public eye. Set up Public Information Table so that others can see what ham radio is all about. Not only can they learn what this wonderful hobby can offer, it can be an invitation to future club meetings and events. What better way to learn about the hobby than to offer a third-party control operator who can help somebody make a contact on the air.

While the internet has made it difficult to get people fascinating about talking to people all over the country or world, can their devices get them connected when the world wide web has decided to take an abrupt siesta? Hams are a self-sufficient group. They can build their own radios, craft their own antennas and provide their own power sources. For the cost of a brand new iPhone or Android, one can get a simple station on the air. I have known some people who enjoy going to Field Day because of the cookout. Field Day is more than racking up the contacts, it is about the whole immersive experience: Setting up, greeting passersby who many be interested in the hobby, catching up with friends around a grill or campfire, hosting an educational lesson directly related to amateur radio, coaching a fellow ham with making contacts or offering to log for them or just being part of a group that wants to have fun. Amateur radio should be welcoming and open its doors to the public, showcasing different facets the hobby has to offer.

Field Day is a perfect opportunity for a Public Information Officer (PIO) to earn some experience. Media is not one dimensional; A PIO can work on reaching out to print, radio and television media outlets to get the word out. Social Media also has a profound effect on promoting activities (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Mastedon, etc.). Your club PIO can work on sending press releases, perhaps adding some local flair to templates they may find. Additionally, they can also exercise some interpersonal relationship skills by reaching out to local elected officials and representatives of agencies.

Dave Hawke, KQ1L, became a Silent Key on Wednesday May 10th 2023. He was 82. A remarkable individual, Dave was from Boothbay Harbor Maine. He spoke with that delightful "Down East" brogue. A humble, unassuming man, Dave told everyone he always lived in Maine except for the years he "went to engineering school in Massachusetts". It was only later we found out that "engineering school" was M I T. From what I gather he was involved in several high level projects while he was there but, of course, he never spoke of this. Dave was a repeater guy. He built an analog repeater network that covered most of the state of Maine which is no small task when you understand how big Maine is. With the advent of digital radios Dave did it again, so now there are both FM and DMR networks covering the state. Dave paid for this equipment out of pocket and refused to accept donations.

During his long career Dave worked for the Maine State Police and Central Maine Power building their repeater networks. Later he was the Kennebeck County computer guy and ran a server farm from his cellar on Cony Street in Augusta. Any amateur radio club or organization could have space on his server at no cost. That included NEAR-Fest. I offered him the same amount that any other company would charge but Dave wouldn't hear of it. I finally was able to get him to accept hotel rooms so he and his XYL Brenda, K1YFY, could stay in comfort at Deerfield and Boxborough MA ARRL conventions every year. It made me happy to see them attending these events and having a good time,

Dave worked into his eighties and even continued to ride his beloved motorcycle taking trips all over the Northeast with Brenda. He only stopped when his illness became debilitating. He beat it the first round but it reappeared last fall and claimed him yesterday. It is a great loss for the many who knew and loved him. I miss him already. May he rest in peace.

NEAR-Fest XXXIV will be dedicated to Dave?s memory. There will be a celebration of Dave'ss life at Deerfield on Friday, October 13th 2023 at 5:00PM. Please visit our web site for details.

The rope tethering a leg of the antenna to the mast near the entrance to CCRCC snapped during a particularly windy winter storm, and the dipole got itself wound around it's mast, the foot pegs, and the ropes and cables running along it. With a bit of luck and a collapsible painter's pole, we got it untangled and replaced the worn rope with something much heavier.
