Shortwave Modernization Coalition Proposal to the FCC



- The ARRL lab has reviewed the technical rules proposed in SMC's petition from the standpoint of potential interference to Amateur Radio communications.
- A technical analysis has been prepared for submission to the FCC.
- The ARRL analysis demonstrates that the rules as proposed in SMC's petition, if adopted, would pose a clear potential for interference into the Amateur bands.
- It may be possible for high-power HF transmissions to co-exist with Amateur communications, but not with the technical rules proposed by SMC.

Amateur Radio Preparedness Act

- H.R. 4006 was reintroduced in the house on June 12th by representatives Bill Johnson (OH-06) and Joe Courtney (CT-02)

"I reintroduced the Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act to remove barriers to disaster and emergency communications and training, and to promote education in STEM subjects related to critically needed wireless technology. Passage of this bill will promote developing and sustaining our nation's wireless future and facilitate and encourage amateur radio operations as a public benefit." – <u>statement</u> by congressman Bill Johnson.

- H.R. 4006 would govern private land use restrictions on amateur radio
 - The full text of the bill is available <u>here</u>.
- ARRL is investing in lobbying efforts and will provide more information on how you can continue help going forward

Symbol Rate Restrictions



- The FCC is meeting on November 15th, 2023, to consider removing the symbol rate restriction on the HF bands.
 - <u>docs.fcc.gov/public/attachments/DOC-397992A1.pdf</u>
- If adopted, the FCC would:
 - Delete the HF symbol rate
 - Adopt a 2.8 kHz bandwidth limit in place of the symbol rate
 - Leave all other rules in place, including:
 - Prohibition of encrypted modes
 - Small sub bands for unattended (automatic) digital modes with bandwidths greater than 500 Hz
 - Initiate a new Further Notice of Proposed Rulemaking in which it:
 - Proposes to eliminate the symbol rates for 6 meters and up
 - Request comment on the signal bandwidth limits already applicable in those bands
 - Request comment on eliminating the symbol rate limits applicable to the LF bands, and whether a bandwidth limit is necessary in those bands
- These steps are 100% consistent with ARRL's position and advocacy

60m Band Pending Changes



- The FCC has issued a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM) which effects Amateur Radio use of the 60m band
 - The FCC proposes to allocate 15 kHz of contiguous bandwidth between 5351.5 5366.5 kHz on a secondary basis with a maximum power of 15 W EIRP (equivalent to 9.15 W ERP). This allocation was adopted at the 2015 World Radiocommunication Conference (WRC-15).
 - The NPRM leaves open the question of whether the existing five 60m channels can still be used for Amateur Radio operation as well as if the 100w power level may still be used.
 - The FCC has requested comments on the existing channel & power issues.
- In 2017, the <u>ARRL petitioned the FCC</u> to keep the four 60-meter channels that fall outside the new band, as well as the current operating rules, including the 100 W ERP limit.
- We asked folks to comment on this NPRM and urge the FCC to keep
 1) the 4 existing channels and 2) the 100w power limit
 - The comment period closes on November 28th, 2023 ET Docket No. 23-120.






Awarded Grants
